**Sled Updates** - All hill patrollers are required to do updates this year. This is a special signup day (not a patrol day) that you will receive a green sheet day for. Let's get back on track and grow a little more. This should be a lot of fun.

**Please, please, please** send in your dispatch. There is no way to complete and publish the dispatch if we don't have your cooperation. You must get your information sent in in a timely manner. It is your responsibility to be responsible.

All of our apprentices and transfers will appreciate a warm fuzzy welcome from all of you. It is important for us to be known not only as a great patrol but also as a friendly, welcome patrol. Good luck to all apprentices and transfers. We wish you all a great year. I hope you all will enjoy what you are doing as much as we enjoy what we are doing. **Things of concern** – If you use the Government Camp building only use the **dead bolt on the front door**. The other day someone stayed there and locked the entry lock from the inside. This created a problem for others needing to get into the building.

If you are patrolling please be on time and plan to stay for the entire day. The areas count on our man power.

The Timberline First Aid room is to be used by patrollers, associates and hill. It is not to be used for family equipment and as a family hangout. Please respect the space that is needed for the patrollers and their equipment. At Mt. Hood Meadows there is to be no family in the patrol room.

**I want to thank all of patrollers that have been doing their job since we started. It is an absolute pleasure to work with each and every one of you. The areas feel the same way. Remember to stay flexible as things can change at any time.**

## Communication – Part II

I got a lot of positive feedback on November's article on communication and where to go with your policy and procedure questions and comments (if you don't remember, the answer was any Executive Council member). This month I address some of the questions I received about operational communications.

### Vice-President Report

**Q:** What should I do if know I cannot make an assigned dispatch day?

**A:** The bottom line on this is that it is your responsibility to find a substitute. The list server ([mhsp-members@comcast.net](mailto:mhsp-members@comcast.net)) is an excellent tool for this. However, it is not sufficient to simply broadcast your need and hope for the best. You must actually strike an agreement with your substitute and then you must call the Hill Captain to let them know the name of your substitute. This last step is important because most of the time your sub forgets to mention the fact to the Hill Captain and after all your responsible work you still get on the green sheet as a "no show".

**Q:** What if I must cancel at the very last moment?

**A:** First, know that your uncovered absence will make the day harder for all the other patrolers at the area. The list of reasonable excuses is pretty limited and two phenomenal patrolers raised the bar on this one a couple years ago when they patrolled after being involved in a serious motor vehicle crash while riding an area shuttle bus.

You must call Dispatch in Government Camp at 503-272-3339 between 7:00 and 7:15 AM to report your absence. Keep calling until you talk to the Dispatcher. If that fails, or you are canceling because of something that happened while en route, call the patrol room at the area or even try the Hill Captain's cell phone.

**Q:** What should I do if I want to patrol on a day for which I am not assigned?

**A:** Patrollers are encouraged to help out on days that are short patrolers. If you know in advance that you want to patrol on a certain day at a certain area you may call the Hill Captain to request permission to join the team. Otherwise, report to the Dispatcher at the Government Camp building between 7:00 AM and 7:15 AM. The Dispatcher will attempt to honor your preference but will assign you to the area where you are most needed. If this assignment is not your favorite choice please be a good sport about this. As they say in the pre-school lunch room, "you git what you git and you don't throw a fit". Simply showing up at an area and asking to patrol is not recommended. If the area is adequately staffed you will be turned down and not have time to go to another area.

**Q:** What do I do if I feel there is a questionable condition on the slopes or in the lodge at a ski area?

**A:** As a first aider and experienced ski patroller you are trained to look out for safety hazards and it is proper that you will develop some opinions. It should go without saying that you do not discuss these opinions with patients, the public, within anyone's hearing and especially not on the radio. If you have a specific concern it should be brought to the attention of the lead pro patroller or the mountain department to be evaluated by the ski area. The proper procedure for doing this is to inform the Hill Captain in person or by telephone, tell them your concerns and the Hill Captain will take it to the appropriate area personnel. If the area disagrees with your assessment accept the decision with dignity and a clear conscience.

Nordic Patrolling is just getting going, with high school races and other events coming up in January and February. On-the-hill and technical evacuation training sessions went great this Fall with excellent participation. Mike Curtis got the radios re-programmed and labeled and our technical hardware has been updated. Dave McCay has inventoried the Medical kits and made some needed improvements, and Sharon has updated our avalanche gear. Now all we need to do is hit the trails and maintain SAR readiness. Great job everyone.

Patroller first responder updates. **Patient information.** At the request of our First Aid Chief, please be sure to note the pulse, blood pressure, O2 saturation, and time observed for all patients for whom you complete an incident form. **Finding a substitute when you need one.** As you know, we rely on you to fulfill your commitment to the patrol by dispatching for, and serving, at least 15 days per year. I certainly understand that sometimes life events interfere with our ability to serve on a day for which we have pre-dispatched. When that happens, please be sure to make every effort to find a substitute for that day. This usually means working your way through the roster and calling as many people as necessary until you find a replacement. While sending out an e-mail request may work for you, it is usually not enough, so plan on making the extra effort to call your fellow patrollers with your request. Once you find a replacement, be sure to inform the Supervisor for that day.

I wish you all the best this holiday season and every happiness in the coming year.

# Area News

## News from Ski Bowl

Mt. Hood Ski Bowl is in full operations. As of this writing, all runs but the Outback are open and the Snow Tube and Adventure Park surrounding the Multoppor Lodge are being enjoyed by eager winter patrons. On weekends, the Lower Bowl chair begins transporting the public at 8:00am with all other chairs doing the same by 8:30am. The Snow Tube and Adventure Park open at 10:00am. The morning meeting conducted by the Hill Captain of the day now commences at 7:45am. All patrollers should be at The Palace no later than 7:30am and booted up, ready to go by 7:45am.

In January, the following new and updated information will be available in The Palace and Rescue Center:

- Basic Statement of Responsibilities for On-the-Hill and Associate Patrollers
- Opening and Closing Assignments
- A Photo Collage of Rope Lines, Fences, & Signage
- Rescue Center Procedures Laminated Assignment Sheets

Please look for these new and revised pieces of information and review them promptly. Should you have any questions or suggestions, please pass them along to the Hill Captain, Daniel Dean, or Ulla Brunette.

Lastly, a few general reminders seem appropriate:

- Patrollers are to park in the chute vs. the parking lot on the East side in the morning.
- Per above, the morning meeting begins at 7:45am.
- The Base Radio at Rescue Center is to remain on Channel 2, the ski area's frequency, and all patrollers' radios should remain on Channel 1, the MHSP frequency. Patrollers at Rescue Center should monitor both channels and communicate via the appropriate radio when necessary. Radio communications are to be kept at a minimum.
- Rescue Center is to be notified of any requests for AMR or Life Flight. Rescue Center will in turn forward the request to the Pro Patrol Director who will contact the appropriate agency. It is imperative that such requests include the patient's age, gender, vital signs, and suspected injury.
- Opening assignments should check all sleds to ensure that they're properly equipped and set up, that sled and backboard packs' contents are dry, and that the runners are de-iced. Rescue Center should be notified of the quantity and type of sleds and 1<sup>st</sup> aid equipment encountered at the top of each lift.
- Lower Bowl assignments are to periodically ski through the West and Parking Lot rope tow areas. Similarly, Cascade assignments are to periodically ski through the Mogul Buster rope tow in Bunny Basin as well as the Snow Tube and Adventure Park.
- East Side 1<sup>st</sup> Aid Room and Cascade assignments are to maintain a physical presence in the Snow Tube and Adventure Park during hours of operation ensuring safety, providing 1<sup>st</sup> aid when necessary, and being an ambassador of the ski area and MHSP.
- Rope lines, fences, and signage should be (re)set using a drill if they're found to be down, leaning, or otherwise out of place.
- Where possible, sleds should be leaned up against the ski patrol (and not lift) shack or a tree at the top of each lift to protect the sled pack and other equipment from the elements.
- The MHSP is on duty until dismissed by the night crew and Hill Captain.
- The MHSP is entitled to discounts on food within both lodges.

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## Did you ever wonder...

...why the patrol's building in Government Camp is variously called "The First Aid Building" and "Dispatch"?

Forty years ago, trail skiing was much more popular than it is today. In years gone by, the final sweep assignment for Timberline patrolers was to ski the Glade Trail well after dark with a sled in tow. Ask one of the old-timers about the pre-sweep meeting at The Blue Ox and about having to load multiple patients into a single akja.

In the early 1960's the US Forest Service constructed our current building as a first aid facility for patients evacuated from the Glade and Alpine Trails. The back room was equipped with several hospital beds where patients could be stabilized and wait for their ambulance or other transportation. Next time you go in notice how there are three sets of double doors in a straight line from the front door to the back room, just like in a hospital.

Our current method of signing up in advance for patrol days did not come into use until the later 1970's. Before that, every patroller who wanted to ski had to show up at the morning dispatch meeting to be assigned to the various areas. First come got first choice and those arriving last got whatever was left. The dispatch meeting was held in the basement of Darr's Mountain Shop (which started in the location that is now Charlie's Mountain View Restaurant and later moved to the stone building that now houses the Mt. Hood Brewing Company). When the Forest Service completed the first aid facility and gave exclusive use of it to the patrol, the morning dispatch meeting was moved to the new building and the name stuck. Even in these days of scheduled assignments we still have a morning dispatch for unassigned patrollers.

## MTR

Here's hoping that Santa brought tons of good cheer and lots of great gadgets and snow camping gear, 'cause January's the meeting where we start to take names of all those who want to come join our snow games.

We'll pass round the list, and we'll ask what you know, about hiking and trekking and caving in snow. Then we'll hand out a sheet with all of the dates and the rules and requirements that MTR takes.

Please do not phone, fax or email to me, rather come to the meeting and there you will see a short presentation of all you should bring to take MTR later on in the Spring.

If you're now an apprentice I'm sorry to say that you won't be invited for training that day. The reason is simple so please don't feel burned, there are many patrolling skills that first you must learn.

We'll see you the 12<sup>th</sup> of January next year, and until then Happy New Year and Holiday Cheer!
