President's Message

Regardless of the weather and snow pack depth everyone I've talked to have been enjoying their patrol days. Some days busier than others, but rewarding regardless of the snow depth. I think a large part of that is attitude, looking at the glass as half full, making it a good day by remaining positive. Looking at the area parking lots, the need for us to be there is clear. This will continue to be true regardless of the storm cycles. Please continue to dispatch, car pool, take the shuttle to Skibowl, in short, keep up the good work you are all doing.

The apprentices are all in full training mode. I've seen the hill apprentices a number of times working on their drills and training. I know the associate apprentices are active and moving through the process of becoming patrollers along with the transfers and apprentice hosts.

There were a couple things discussed at the general meeting that everyone should be aware of. Recognizing the fine service provided by Pete Campbell and Dan Gates at Skibowl on December 27, we

received a donation from a 10 year olds grateful parents. Cleo mentioned some other folks that were also doing a stellar job in responding to cases. In addition, the care received by patients has been noted by the area hospitals and kudos given by them to MHSP.

On a different note we have an agreement for the coming year's ski and snowboard swap to be at Washington County Fairgrounds. They can ensure a place to hold it, provide room to expand and could offer earlier equipment drop-off times if we want to do that. Look for more information from the swap committee but PLEASE, block out time so you can help on at least one shift October 26 through 28.

It's not too early for you to start thinking about recognizing outstanding patrollers. As quickly as the past year zipped by, it will be May 19 and the banquet before we know it. Please make sure you let the associate supervisor and/or hill captain know so they can get it on the green sheet. If you don't think about it until after, please contact someone on the council. We need specifics to get the recognition process rolling.

Now seems like a good time to remind members that if they have concerns or issues with the areas the first point of contact should be the area patrol chief (APC). If it's specific to the day, please talk with the hill captain and/or associate supervisor as well. Hosts should speak to the supervisor of the day, the area host coordinator or the mountain host director.

If you feel your concern is not addressed by these people, please talk with me or the patrol chief. The trustees are another place to go. They are here both to help us remember how we got to specific practices but also to help with patroller concerns. And of course you can contact anyone on the council if that's your preference. What you should not do is take a concern outside the patrol without giving us a chance to resolve the issue. Often, things are not as they seem, there's a reason for what's being requested or happening and simply communicating will help clarify if not resolve the issue.

Your APCs are listed on the dispatch site on the home page. Diane Kindell-Potter and Claudia Pieters have Summit, John Howard and I have Timberline, Matt Rea and Shelly Johnson have Skibowl, Eric Pool And Kat Moore have Meadows.

The Skibowl host contacts are Jack Barry and John Moss. Hosts at Timberline can also talk with Mountain Services, Rhonda Bateman or Laura Bennett.

Last but not least, a big THANKS to David Atkinson for proofing the list for patrol cards and John Gastineau for getting them printed. Please get yours and make sure you have it while patrolling. You should always carry your MHSP, OEC and NSP cards (these will be coming soon). The forest service representative, Andrew Burrows, may ask to see your card. A list of patrollers was provided to each area but for confirmation it's possible he'd want to see them.

FIRST AID

Back Raft for Backboards

At the request of AMR most of the areas are now using the Back Raft™ as a way to cushion patients who will be on a backboard for a long transport time. Any time that we put a patient on a backboard at one of the resorts that we serve the transport time will be a long time and cushioning should be used.

Most of the backboard bags have been stocked with the Back Raft. To use the Back Raft simply blow a few breaths of air into the Back Raft. The shut-off valve is different from many other valves. The shut-off handle must be perpendicular to the inlet tube when blowing air into the Back Raft. The closed position is in-line with the tube. (If you think about which position is less likely to be accidentally knocked to the open position it will be easy to remember which way is closed.)

Place the Back Raft on the backboard using the two built in straps for the top of the board. There is some tape on the lower bottom of the Back Raft to secure it to the board. After securing the Back Raft to the backboard place the patient on the board as usual. AMR can put more air into the Back Raft if necessary.



Radio Handling

It looks like WINTER is here again.

With this, it is important to remind everyone about radio handling protocols.

Please never wear the radio on the outside of your coat. This exposes it to the weather and is responsible for diminished performance from our radios and early failure.

Wearing the radio inside your coat will give the best protection.

Please never handle the antenna, it is not a handle. The tiny fibers in the antenna are easily damaged by the bending of the antenna.

At present, we have a number of radios that are operating below the 100% performance level for the very reasons just mentioned. With proper care and handling, we can avoid unnecessary repairs that are not only costly, but take radios out of service which can impose tighter limits on how many hosts can do shifts because we need a radio for each host in uniform.

I know that when the sun is out, there are no exposure issues to wearing a radio on the outside of your coat. The problem lies in when to draw the line and wear it inside. It would be best if we eliminate the "outside the coat" option unless you find a clever way to totally protect it. Some of our group wear it outside because they saw someone else doing it first.

One option is a totally waterproof radio pouch sold thru a "whitewater kayaking" catalogue. I actually own one of them and will be happy to bring it in and show it to anyone interested. The cost was about \$30.

Mt. Hood SnoSport Swap Results

Financial Results

Sales for the 2011 SnoSport Swap were up nearly 25% over 2010, generating \$26,000.00 in net proceeds, which will be split with the West Linn High School Snowboard Team. The driving force behind this year's increase was the marketing push lead by Steve Johnson, Doug Stanton and their teams. They did an outstanding job getting the word out at a grass roots level and gathered a lot of data that will go towards making next year's efforts even more effective.

I must also report that over the first years of the swap net income was over reported. This happened largely as a result of a lack of clarity with respect to Sno-park incomes, complicated by Ski Fever and MHSP Sno-park sales coming right on the heels of the Swap and drawing on the same pool of Sno-park passes.

Lisa Hargrave has worked tirelessly over several months autopsying past years' records to give us a fully documented accounting of all swap income. Corrected total net swap income from the first three swap years is as follows:

2008	\$2,335.00
2009	\$7,962.00
2010	\$16,897.00

In the process of reviewing past years Lisa also discovered our partners had been overpaid a total of \$3,900.00. West Linn has paid back a portion this year and will clear up the balance over the next two events. Systems are now in place to insure that all future swaps will be conducted in full accordance with commonly accepted accounting practices and procedures.

Change of Venue for 2012

In 2012 the swap will be moving from West Linn High School to the Washington County Fairgrounds. After a long and extensive search encompassing all of the greater Portland Metro area, it was determined that the facility at Washington County was the only one in our area that was able to guarantee dates and meet the events need for expanded space in the years to come.

Based on the agreement we have signed with the fairgrounds, subsequent Swaps will be held on the last weekend of October. That means that the 2012 SnoSport Swap will be held October 26th, 27th and 28th. Your Swap committee hopes that being able to count on the event taking place the same weekend every year will make planning easier for all concerned and give the marketing teams a reference date to hang their hats on.

Thanks

My personal thanks goes out to the committee chairs and team leads that give so much of their personal time to insure this event's success every year, and of course to the volunteers, so many of whom dispatch for far more than their required minimum number of shifts.

10th Annual Ski The Glade Trail day

The Mt. Hood Cultural Center and Museum will hold this annual event on March 3, 2012. Once a year, under permit from the US Forest Service, the historic Glade Ski Trail is opened and groomed for this participatory living history event. This once popular downhill ski trail starts at Timberline Lodge and ends in Government Camp, a distance of three miles.

Before the advent of high speed ski lifts, highly groomed slopes and extreme snowboard acrobatics, skiing long trails was popular. According to Lloyd Musser, Museum Curator, "this event helps fulfill our mission of preserving and interpreting the history of Mt. Hood". This is a chance for grandparents to ski with their grandchildren and share the memories of skiing the Glade Trail, when it was the biggest ski adventure on Mt. Hood."

Participants are treated to a red carpet day of skiing. Skiers are shuttled to Timberline in comfortable airport shuttle vans, escorted by local guides and senior members of the Mt. Hood Ski Patrol, and served a hearty lunch. Shuttles will run from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM allowing ticket holders to make several trail runs. The events of the day are recounted at the *après* ski party, where prizes are awarded. Wearing vintage ski clothing is encouraged.

Participation is limited to 75 skiers. Event tickets are \$100.00 per person, a portion of which is deductible as a donation to the MHCC&M, a non-profit organization. Members of Mt. Hood Cultural Center & Museum receive 10% discount. Tickets may be purchased at the museum, or by calling 503-272-3301. Visa is accepted.
