Preliminary Swap Report

Hood SnoSports Swap is winding down. Did I mention that although no one has had lunch, the remaining volunteers are really putting a dent in the food and drink donations on the HR table? Thank you all who brought goodies to share!

As the Swap Committee projected, with the change of venue and the September date, the numbers were down this year. The good news is while admissions ran at about the same level as the 2009 Swap; the average patron spent almost 50% more than they did that year, pushing 2012 sales up close to the \$150k mark – a very strong foundation to build on.

Our vendors were impressed with the facility, the layout, the organization and how much customer traffic we were able to generate even with the new location (thank you marketing). The feeling is that we are firmly on a growth path and in a facility that will be able to accommodate the SnoSports Swap for years to come.

I want to personally applaud the committee chairs, team leads and their families. Most of these individuals logged over 100 hours of their personal time insuring that all the pieces were in place to make this year's transition work, properly laying the corner stone for future events.

75TH ANNIVERSARY

A Look Back

In the Beginning...

It was early 1937. FDR was sworn in for a second term as president. New Deal programs such as the Works Progress Administration were in full swing. The unemployment rate was still over 14% but that was down from a high of 25% in 1934. Internationally, American volunteers were fighting fascism in Spain, hostilities were about to break out between Japan and China, and Germany had re-occupied the Rhineland; but the events that would lead to WWII were still in the future.

Locally, Mt. Hood was a popular destination for adventure. Summit Ski Area (then called the Winter Sports Facility) had been in operation since 1927 and ski jumping competitions had drawn crowds since 1929. Numerous climbing clubs operated on the mountain. Construction on the WPA's Timberline Lodge had begun the year before and the winter of 1937 was the first that the road to Timberline was kept open.

With vehicle access to 6000', skiing exploded. However, it was still an extreme adventure sport that involved arduous uphill climbs and careening down ungroomed and unmarked forest trails. The lack of safety equipment and inexperience of most skiers meant that many people became injured and stranded in the alpine wilderness with only their untrained companions to help them.

It was inevitable that the climbers of the Wy'east Climbers and the Nile River Yacht Club (who had club cabins located near today's Wy'east run at Timberline) would become involved in the rescue of these injured skiers. And so it happened that, at the prompting of the club leaders, the US Forest Service hired a notable young climber named Hank Lewis to be the first paid ski patroller on Mt. Hood and to form a volunteer rescue force.

Through the efforts of Hank Lewis, Wy'east President Everett Darr, and Nile River Captain Barney Macnab, fifty volunteers were recruited. By March of 1938 bylaws had been hammered out and officers elected. MHSP was an official organization with Barney Macnab as president and Hank Lewis as patrol chief.

Since the patrol was operating under the direction of the Forest Service, the shape of the USFS shield was adopted as the patrol emblem (MHSP is the only organization authorized to do so). Each member was awarded a silver pin with their badge number engraved on it; the first fifty numbers being awarded by lottery. This tradition continues today. At the completion of training every new patroller receives a badge that continues the numbers that began with Barney Macnab, #1.

Why not in March? To tie in with the Mt. Hood History Museum's Ski the Glade event that weekend.


75th Anniversary Commemorative Poster

First Aid Chief

OEC Refreshers

We have completed one of three OEC Refreshers. If you have not attended a Refresher please Dispatch for one of the remaining Refreshers on October 6 or November 3. The Refreshers are at Meridian Park Hospital. Registration opens at 07:15 and we start at 08:00 sharp.

It is important that you attend an OEC Refresher even if you don't think that you will patrol this year. It is extremely difficult for you to make up a missed Refresher.

First Aid Kudos

You have probably heard me say that your first aid skills can and are being used in your community. Your first aid skills and your willingness to step in when help is needed are very commendable and valuable to those in your community. Listed below are just a few of the people that have used their first aid skills recently in the community:

John Lacey – John witnessed a serious motorcycle crash on a freeway in Washington. John triaged the situation and provided care for the two patients. Before it was all over John had to treat another rider for heat exhaustion as she waited at the scene in the hot weather.

Dave Miller – Dave witnessed a bicycle vs. car crash in his own neighborhood. Dave was also riding a bicycle and did not have any first aid gear with him. Dave assessed the patient, stabilized the patient's severely injured leg, got the SAMPLE questions answered and basically reassured the patient until the local EMS personnel arrived. He even got a bystander to take photos of him providing first aid.

Eric Carlson – Eric was in exactly the right place while on a camping trip. A friend choked on a piece of meat and was unable to breath. Without hesitation Eric got the friend to stand up and then he used the Heimlich maneuver on her. The piece of meat popped out and the friend sat down and continued eating. Way to go Eric!!

Steven Shafer – While at a Hood River restaurant Steven heard some glass break and then realized that an employee had a severe laceration on her foot. Steven got his first aid gear from his car and worked with another person to provide first aid to the employee. They stopped the bleeding and bandaged the wound. Steven just finished the OEC Course in May.

Jeff Ezzell – Jeff was sitting in traffic on his way to work when he saw a towed crane crash into a school bus shoving it over 50 feet and leaving it precariously balanced on two wheels. Jeff was able to climb through the front window of the bus to assess and stabilize the patient before paramedics arrived. Photos:

Yes, it's time to start training and preparing ourselves for the upcoming ski season. Most of you have started some of the training activities that took place in September, but we have many more to go. Look at your calendars now and start prioritizing dates for patrolling activities, as well as getting yourself in mental and physical shape for this season! MHSP puts in a tremendous amount of hours of volunteering during the ski season, and I want everyone to know how much the areas appreciate us! So, training and refreshing is next on our agenda for October/November. Make sure you sign up for our upcoming mandatory OEC refreshers, Chair Evacuation and CPR updates if you need them. **Please communicate with me if you have any issues preventing you from your training requirements!**

The Areas

We will be meeting with the ski areas soon to get organized and iron out all the benefit details and area specific changes for this coming season. So stay tuned for more information in the coming months.

Your Commitment

Remember that your benefits package that you sign up for at the OEC refreshers are based on your days you put in the 2011-2012 season. If you **fulfilled** your commitment level last season, **you may sign up for any level this season**. If you **did not fulfill** your commitment level last season, **you may only sign up for the level below last season**. Look at your schedule early and sign up for your preferred days early so you are assured of getting those specific days you want. This is your time of year to decide how many days of incredible skiing and riding you want to get in. Remember, we have minimum days per module to dispatch, so please be aware of this requirement and don't try to frontload your commitment days!

Training and Clinics

We will be offering some wonderful options for all members of the MHSP again this season. **All Hill patrollers will be required to be checked off on toboggan handling!** Details and dates to follow when these sessions are available. Toby and the training staff will be offering women's clinics, toboggan enhancement seminars, skiing skills clinics and many more great opportunities taught by the best of the best from our own patrol and beyond. If you have never attended the Nuts and Bolts three-day clinic in June, put in on your calendar to attend this year. Jeffrey Weitz has expanded the clinics to include many more classes for Instructors and patrollers. You don't want to miss it! Senior ski and toboggan (S&T) courses will be offered throughout the season and are open to all those hill patrollers who want to advance their skills and techniques in the transportation disciplines.

This season we will be holding our Senior Transportation Training Clinics in conjunction with the Oregon Region and we are offering multiple dates for those wishing to participate both at Mt. Hood and around the Oregon Region as well. We will be posting all the dates for Senior Transportation Training Clinics being offered this coming season on the PNWD Calendar on the Website at www.nsp-pnwd.org

Additional clinics will be conducted in other regions as well in Washington and Idaho and all senior candidates are welcome to participate at outside areas with permission from your local region advisor.

If you would like to train for the Senior final evaluations being held at Mt. Hood this season on April 7, 2012 Please contact Jeffrey Weitz or Tom Payne to get signed up for the program and scheduled into some of the clinics.

In addition, all patrollers who have completed the Senior Program and become NSP Alpine Seniors must take a refresher course once every three years to maintain their Senior status. All Senior Patrollers are welcome to participate in one or more clinics offered in our division which will satisfy this requirement.

Instructor Development

Check out the Instructor Development course. It covers various areas of educational knowledge that can be applied to create a positive learning experience, not only while teaching ski patrol topics but in other areas of your work and personal life. Did You Know?

It is a hiring requirement for paid patrollers at the major areas to be able to climb 1,000 feet in an hour. As a point of reference that is from the top of Pucci to the top of the Mile. This last season the patrollers at Timberline each completed a test climb – in full patrol gear wearing pack, ski boots and carrying their skis. Word is that the record was a little over 20 minutes and that most completed the hike in 30-40.

Of course volunteers are not subject to the climbing requirement. But if you were thinking of adding some stairs to your workout . . .
