HOST SUMMER SEASON

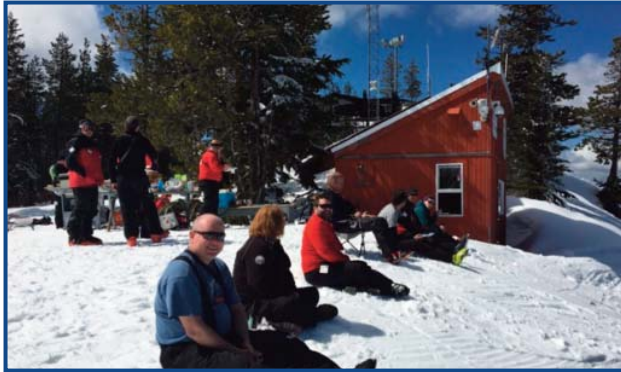

PULSEPOINT APP LED TO USE OF CPR

On April 5 John Lacey and his wife were attending a performance at a local theater, when the PulsePoint app on John's cell phone notified him of the need for CPR inside the theater. John went to the theater lobby and was directed to a patron who was in need of CPR. John followed the CPR training that he had received through Mt. Hood Ski Patrol and began chest compressions on the adult male patient. An employee brought an AED to John, John attached the AED and the AED delivered a shock. John continued chest compressions, the patient gasped for air and then John was able to detect a pulse. About that time local fire department personnel arrived on the scene and took over patient care.

There are two really important take away messages from this story.

The first is to pay attention during CPR training, because you never know when you will need to use that training.

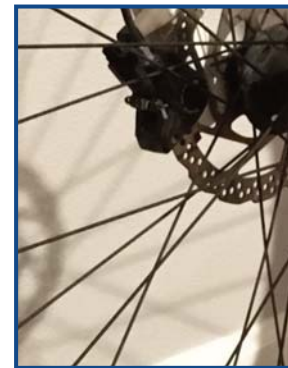
The other is the successful use of the PulsePoint App. John encourages anyone who is CPR trained and who has a modern smart phone to download the app to your smart phone. The cell phone will receive a notice if CPR is needed in the vicinity of the phone. The app can also be used to view local fire department calls that are in progress. Ever wonder where the fire engine is going in your neighborhood? The PulsePoint app can tell you the answer.
