## Message From the President

We have entered that time of year when we begin rapidly gearing up for the upcoming winter season. It is a busy time of year for ski patrollers. Hopefully by now you have completed your necessary CPR classes. You have at least started your OEC refresher manuals and some of you have completed the refresher session. You have either scheduled or completed your annual chair evacuation training session.

We will be holding our first MHSP General Meeting of the year in October. We will discuss important information regarding the patrol and our activities. There will be fresh gear for sale from the Clothing/Uniform Committee. And yes, there will be a social activity afterward. I encourage all members to attend and reconnect with your patrol friends. The meeting details are provided below in a separate article on page two.

This time of year is also important for us for fund raising. The two big events, Snowvana and Ski Fever, have actually surpassed the Ski Swap in fundraising opportunity for MHSP with much less effort – mostly through the sale of Snow Park Permits. Both of these events are also great recruiting opportunities for MHSP. Finally, they are just a lot of fun to attend. Your Council has been fielding many questions from members regarding our plans for operations this winter. I wish I could give you more answers but frankly, we are still working out the details.

- Last week Mt. Hood Skibowl informed us that they have hired one of MHSP's finest, Mr. Stuart Stanger, as their new Patrol Director. Congratulations Stuart—we are proud of you.
- Mt. Hood Meadows is in the process of hiring a new Patrol Director and should have one selected very soon.
- We cannot finalize plans for training and for area operations until we have a chance to sit down and discuss operations with the area staff. However, my assumption is that MHSP support to all areas will be very much like last season.
- Timberline has purchased the Summit Ski Area is still working out their operating plans for the upcoming season. Once again, our assumption is that the MHSP role at Summit will be very similar to previous years.
- All of the areas were pleased overall with the team approach we integrated last year. We will continue that same basic approach this year without major change but we do think that there will be some refinements in the way teams are structured (numbers and types of slots), team membership, and rules for dispatch.
- Finally, many members are asking what the implications will be for patrollers who did not complete their minimum requirements last year: either the MHSP 8-days of patrolling minimum, or their minimum commitments to the areas as an area team member, including patrolling summer days. Frankly, the majority of our members missed their minimums and Council is still trying to determine what the outcomes should be.

All I can say is that we are all volunteers trying to do the right thing.

## Treasurers Report

We have received confirmation from the State of Oregon that Sno-Park permits will be available in early October. The cost to the patrol will remain the same as last year. Last year Sno-Park permits were \$25 to the patrol and we resold them to the public for \$30.

Last year the MHSP dues were \$30. The \$7 difference this year is due to an aggressive training program for 2018-19 that the majority of members will hopefully avail themselves of. Your payment will include both the Region and Division dues.

### Dues Payment Options

- **NEW FOR THIS YEAR** – We plan to offer a **pay-ahead option** utilizing PayPal. The goal is to reduce the checkout bottleneck at the OEC Refreshers. The process will be similar to that used for Banquet payments through PayPal. We also plan to offer the option of pre-purchasing Sno-Park Passes.
- **AT OEC** – Pay at the end of the sessions with either Credit Card, Check, or Cash.

We are looking at dispatch records, meeting with the areas and hope to have the 2018-19 dispatch up and ready by November.


### Additional training days at Mt Hood Meadows (MHM).

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## Mountain Host Operations

### Host Dispatch

The dispatch for the approaching winter season will populate with shifts in early November, following the enrollment period for the 2018-19 season. An email will go out on the list server when dispatch is open.

### Requirements for Active Status

The enrollment period will take place during October. Stay tuned for emails with details in the weeks ahead.

The 2018-19 requirements for the host division are as follows:

1. Minimum shift commitment of 10 shifts.
2. Attendance at one of the refresher trainings scheduled for 9/29 and 11/11
3. A current CPR card or a signed commitment to get one ASAP.
4. Dues payment to MHSP.

### New Shift at Timberline

We are adding a new shift on the weekends for those who are interested in a “full day” duty. The shift will be called MF for “Full day.” We will still have the traditional ½ day shifts. Shifts at Skibowl and Summit are still being reviewed. Final determinations for shifts will happen when we meet with the resort management in the weeks ahead.

### Refresher Training

We are working on structuring “required” refresher training for all hosts. The details are still being worked out, but the basic plan is to perform refresher training on the same dates and at the same locations that MHSP conducts Chair Evac refresher for patrollers.

We plan to divide into groups that will rotate between several refresher-training sessions. The topics to be covered include:

- 1050 response protocols
- Radio usage on the patrol channel – includes “overdue guest” protocols
- Guest relations

### CPR

As we move toward the next season, we will need to become CPR certified. Both the Council and all resort leadership teams believe that CPR is an important, critical, and life-saving skill that we, as members of MHSP, are trained to perform.

We have less than three months before we start membership renewal for the next season. During this period, MHSP conducts CPR training for members. Dispatch is currently open for sign up for CPR refresher classes. A full CPR class will be needed if you don't have a current CPR card being renewed. James Schuler is putting these classes together for members who need them.



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## Instructor Development

The first half is completed online, and the second half requires classroom attendance to present a six-pack lesson and learn about the instructor mentoring process. 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## Senior OEC Program

### Senior OEC starts in December

The Senior OEC program is now known as the OEC Module of the Senior Program (OEC-MSP).

In the OEC-MSP you will use and refine all of your OEC skills. You will also improve your leadership, problem-solving, and decision-making skills, and learn how to use some different equipment. You will learn how to take charge a scene with one or more injured patients and then direct others to assist you. You will work with patrollers from other ski areas in Oregon.



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The minimum requirements to participate in the OEC-MSP are that you have completed your rookie year and that you have a moderate level of experience with treating actual patients. The more hands-on experience you have, the better you will do in the program. The OEC-MSP is mentally and physically demanding. Imagine participating in six full-blown scenarios in one day.

The proposed training dates are as follows:

- December 6 – In town at night
- December 13 – In town at night

All dates below are on the mountain during the day:

- January 12
- January 26 – Clinic with Oregon Region at Hoodoo Ski Area (Santiam Pass)
- February 9
- March 2
- March 23
- March 30 – Final at Mt. Hood

### Now, About the Rules

Just a few reminders about some of the building rules. Please read the rules already posted in the building.

- Everyone must pay \$10 per night and **SIGN THE GUESTBOOK**. If you are not paying online, go upstairs and find the mailbox. Grab an envelope and write your name, the dates you stayed over, and your MHSP number on the envelope. Place your cash or check inside the envelope and place it in the mailbox slot.
- If you are sleeping in your car/van/RV/hammock/tent/bivy or whatever outside the building, you **still** need to donate \$10 and sign the guestbook. The only reason you would not pay \$10 is if you never even enter the building and do not use any of the facilities at all (this is called *camping*).

- Individuals on dispatch for the next day get bed priority - be courteous to your fellow patrollers. Let's say you are on dispatch Saturday and not Sunday, and there are no beds available Saturday night. However, somebody on dispatch for Sunday needs your bed - please allow them to use "your" bed before their day of patrol. Please ask someone before you move their belongings.
- The Govy building is for active ski patrollers. Guests are generally not allowed, especially during the winter when it's typically expected that all the beds will be filled. It is preferred that you contact me ahead of time if you are thinking of bringing a guest (they will still need to donate \$10).
- Dogs (or animals/pets of any type) are not allowed upstairs and are not allowed on any of the furniture. If your pet (and this is mostly dogs) is staying overnight they need to be in a crate. When there is a high-use weekend in the building, it would be preferred that you do not bring your pet.
- Please keep the noise to a minimum at night to allow everyone to get a good night of sleep. Keep in mind that sometimes other patrollers need to wake up much earlier than you so their "night time" begins earlier than yours.
- Take the garbage when you leave and don't forget to clear out your food from the fridge!

Again, please read the rules already posted in the building. You can check out the MHSP Wiki page for more information.

### **Training Requirements**

Renewing Hill, Associate, and Nordic Patrollers who took Level 1 or refreshed in the 2015-2016 season are now due for a one day "Basic Avalanche Refresher." Dispatch for only one date, choose one of the following dates: 3/23, 3/24, 3/30, 4/6, or 4/7.

Rookie Hill and Nordic Patrollers are required to take a 4-day Level 1 course. This course is one classroom day, one weekend field session, and one refresher day. This class is also open to current Associates, Rookie Associates, or Apprentice patrollers who are interested. Dates are:

- Level 1 classroom (choose one): 12/2 or 12/8
- Level 1 field session weekend (choose one two-day session): 2/23-2/24 or 3/16-3/17

- Basic Avalanche Refresher (required fourth day of Level 1): choose one of the following dates: 3/23, 3/24, 3/30, 4/6, or 4/7.

All Apprentices must participate in one evening Avalanche Awareness course during their apprentice year. Locations are in town and detailed information is on the calendar. Dates are 12/6 or 1/9. This training is also open to other interested patrollers.-

### Upcoming races needing support:

- **Portlandathon: Sunday October 7, Portland, OR.**

The Portland Marathon has been reorganized under new management and will host the first "Portlandathon", which is a full Boston qualifier marathon. We have been asked to join their medical team. It will be an early day as marathons tend to begin early. We will most likely meet around 06:00 as the marathon starts at 07:00.

There are still openings on the dispatch for this race; please join us if you can! And yes, this follows a planned OEC Refresher that is scheduled for Saturday October 6.

We will be providing bike patrol assistance on the main marathon course as well as on the 4K course that families are encouraged participate in.



We may provide medical support at stations on the courses as well as triaging at the main medical tent. We also will be prepared to help at the finish line.

The dispatch is now set at 20 patrollers and 5 hosts, which may be changed upwards if needed.

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## Bottle Drop Fundraiser information

We now have a Fundraiser BottleDrop account. So, what does that mean? You will see that the recycle bins at the Govy Bldg for glass (drinking) bottles, aluminum cans, and plastic (drinking) bottles will now have blue BottleDrop bags in them. Once a bag is full it will be transported to a BottleDrop location. The barcode on each bag allows the person delivering it to use the easy drop-off door feature. The person dropping off will simply open the door, place the blue bag inside, close the door (make sure it locks!), and then go about their normal day; BottleDrop employees will take care of the rest. It's pretty easy on our part!

There is a 35-cent processing fee for each bag but after that the rest of the money goes into the MHSP account. When it is time to get more bags we do have to buy them at \$2.00 per 10 bags.

If anyone who lives in Oregon would like to take a bag or two home to fill up on your own, please do so! We just ask that you let Mick Tarsel, our new Govy Building Manager, know how many bags you took so we can keep track of when we need to order more bags. If you do take a bag or two home, once it is filled please follow the directions above for dropping it off at a BottleDrop location.

Please dispatch into the slot, which most closely aligns with your time assigned by the Snowvana volunteer coordinator.

If you have friends or family who volunteer for the event please have them select MHSP as their organization affiliation as well – it helps us look good. Volunteers must be at least 21.

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# In Memoriam

## **HERBERT "BILL" KRUGER (1928 - 2018)**

Bill Kruger, MHSP #237, passed on to a snowier mountain on 29 July 2018. Bill joined MHSP in 1953, and was President of the MHSP in 1957. He was on the Patrol for over 20 years and attended both the University of Oregon and Lewis and Clark College. After Serving in the Army, Bill joined the Portland Police Bureau in 1959, retiring in 1988. Although he could be very serious when needed, he had a great sense of humor.

His time on the mountain was special to both him and his family. His son, Terry, and daughter-in-law, Susan, shared these comments and a poem they thought Bill would have enjoyed.

"In memory of Herbert (Bill) Kruger. Bill was such a good skier and it brought him great joy to be on the mountain. I think he would have enjoyed this short poem."
